Giving people choices

We believe people should be able to decide, wherever possible, how they want to live through to the end of their life - this includes helping them fulfil their final wishes.

If a person expresses a wish to spend the last days of their life at home, surrounded by their own personal belongings, their special memories and the security they bring, then our Hospice at Home team are on hand. The team support the patient and their family to reduce worries and anxiety whilst being made comfortable.

Retaining our greatest asset - our clinical teams

Our nurses, doctors, staff and volunteers are our greatest assets.

The care given by our nurses not only involves a detailed, personalised care programme, it involves providing psychological, social and spiritual support to ensure the best quality of life for patients and their family.

We make sure our patients' wishes have been explored at every possible opportunity, requiring a high level of skill and appreciation for what is important to the patient and their family.

Delivery of care would be impossible without our highly skilled multi-disciplinary team.

Our reach

We are the only adult hospice that provides specialist palliative and end of life care throughout Cambridgeshire. Our team

operate from the Arthur Rank Hospice in Cambridge, the Alan Hudson Day Treatment Centre in Wisbech and across the community via our Arthur Rank Hospice Community Team. "I love spending time with patients.
It is a real privilege to be with them at such an important point in their life.
Sometimes they will not be with us very long but you can see the relief in their faces when they are settled in the Hospice - so often they tell us they have a sense of peace just being here."

Care extending beyond our patients - patient and family support team

When we are caring for a patient, their relatives, loved-ones and friends can all be greatly affected. We recognise that patients and their families are often encountering a host of conflicting emotions and immense tension when facing serious illness and death.

Supporting someone close to you who has been diagnosed with a life-limiting illness, or coming to terms with the death of a loved-one can be very difficult.

Our family support team are there for you to reach out to.

We understand the huge role loved ones play in the patient's journey and do what we can to help them face today, tomorrow and the future - helping promote their long-term wellbeing.

Making every moment count is crucial in life and death and your generosity enables our patients to live well and supports their loved ones to live on.

Our patient and family support team supported 337 patients and loved ones

Keeping families together - personal spaces

Moments in time are even more precious when a patient is nearing the end of their life. Battling the logistics of travel, the heartache of being apart and the notion of not saying goodbye can be too much to bear. We have two dedicated, private family suites, to enable families to stay close.

The inpatient unit has a family lounge and communal areas which allows space to reminisce about the good times, to try to make sense of the difficulty of the situation or simply to have time together.

Our garden provides a sense of restoration and recuperation for anyone that enters and brings a sense of normality helping patients and visitors cope with another day.

The Bistro welcomes patients and families to come together in a friendly atmosphere, where freshly cooked meals can be enjoyed whilst sitting amongst visitors, staff and volunteers.

We believe it's our duty to support loved ones to be together for as long as needed and in the way that feels right.

We provide over 4,200 patients a year, with care that is personalised to meet their needs.

"It doesn't feel like a place you go to die.
It feels like the place where you go to
live out the last bits, to live, at the end.
Somewhere you're going to, to make the
most of whatever time is left, and to do
it in comfort and security.

This was the worst thing that has ever happened to me, that I have ever experienced or I could imagine ever experiencing in my life - the shock and the quickness of the situation - and I feel confident saying the same about Mike. I find it astounding that despite the torture of that situation, there was still something positive in it and that - without a shadow of a doubt - is what we got from the hospice."

Mike, aged 43, was diagnosed with terminal renal cancer with metastatic bone cancer in January 2017. He was cared for at the Hospice for three months. Kirsty [words above] and her four year old daughter Lizee, were able to stay in one of our family apartments so they could be by Mike's side.

The Evelyn Living Well Centre and Bradbury Wellness Centre - a haven for supportive, rehabilitative care

With patients presenting such a wide range of symptoms and conditions it is now more important than ever to provide a variety of supportive sessions to meet these particular needs.

These evolving services are essential for not only patients, but their carers and loved ones too. Our specialist palliative care team create tailored care plans for patients to address complications including breathlessness, mobility and reduced independence.

Both Living Well and the Wellness Centre provide a relaxed environment to help our day patients feel at ease, so they can get the most out of the support we provide. We help patients and their family take care of their physical, social and psychological wellbeing by offering a number of supportive therapies and treatments, which include: art, music, exercise and complementary therapy.

We are passionate in ensuring every patient has access to the right care, at the right time and that it should be tailored to meet the needs of each individual.

Our complementary therapists provide 305 people* with specialist treatments each year.

Types of gifts:

Share of your estate - also known as a residuary gift. This is a share of what is left of your estate after all other gifts have been distributed. You may decide to either leave the total or a percentage.

Cash gift - or a pecuniary gift. This is a gift of a fixed sum of money.

Specific gift. This is a named item left in your Will, such as a piece of jewellery, art or a car.

It is usually guite straight forward to make a Will, however we recommend that you seek professional advice when planning your Will to make sure it is valid and legal.

If you already have a Will in place and wish to remember the Charity with a gift, a solicitor can make an amendment to your Will using a codicil.

Your gift will help us continue making every moment count for our future patients and loved ones.

- 1981 Arthur Rank House opens on Mill Road officially opened by the Duchess of Kent
- 1988 Community Nurse Specialist Team operate from Arthur Rank Hospice (now part of the Specialist Palliative Care Home Team)
- 1992 Lymphoedema Clinic set up as pilot study
- **1995** Regent Street shop opens
 - Bernard Reiss Centre opened to house Day Therapy
- 2000 Friends of Arthur Rank House becomes Arthur Rank Hospice Charity
- **2002** Prince Charles visits (now King Charles III)
- 2004 Library opens
- **2006** Arthur Rank Hospice Charity launches Hospice at Home service
- **2010** Mill Road Charity shop opens
- **2012** Rebrand to current logo
- **2015** Work starts on building the new Hospice
 - Alan Hudson Day Treatment Centre in Wisbech becomes an Arthur Rank Hospice managed service

- **2016** New Hospice in Shelford Bottom opens
- **2017** Cottenham charity shop opens
 - MND clinic locates at Arthur Rank Hospice Charity
- **2018** Burleigh Street Charity shop opens
- **2019** Alan Hudson Day Treatment Centre starts Community Specialist Palliative Care Service
 - First president, Lady Chadwyck-Healey was appointed
 - Transitioning Young Peoples service commenced
- **2020** Caring Communities launched and Hospice at Home offers day time service in addition to night time service
 - Our Retail Hub in Sawston opens to include 2nd hand furniture and household items
- **2021** Help at Hand community app launched and Palliative Care Hub is created
 - Day Therapy rebranded to Living Well
- **2022** 40 years Anniversary and the Palliative Care Hub advice line becomes 24/7
 - Alan Hudson Day Treatment centre is officially opened by Her Royal Highness the Duchess of Gloucester
