Arthur Rank Hospice Charity (Registered Charity No 1133354) supports people in Cambridgeshire, living with an advanced serious illness or other life-limiting condition and those who need end-of-life care. Services are provided free of charge to patients and their families, helping them to make every moment count.

The Hospice provides care and support to more than 4,100 patients each year at the Hospice in Cambridge, the Alan Hudson Day Treatment Centre in Wisbech and in patients' own homes via the Arthur Rank Community Team. This 'Outstanding' care supports people to improve their quality of life and fulfil their end of their life choices.

Alongside the care provided by the Inpatient Unit, Living Well services and Hospice at Home teams, patients can access: patient and family support (including counselling, bereavement and spiritual support); lymphoedema care; complementary therapy; medical and pain outpatient clinics; and advice from the clinical nurse specialists within the Specialist Palliative Care Home Team. Programmes are practical, holistic and tailored to the individual patient, family member or carer. Depending on need, length of support can vary from a matter of hours to a period of years and may also include rehabilitative support, physiotherapy, occupational therapy and psychological support.

Arthur Rank Hospice Charity's 'Outstanding' services, will cost £12.12 million to run in 2023/2024 and are provided free of charge to patients and their families. Income from NHS contracted services is budgeted at £7.33 million, meaning that £4.79 million needs to be raised through donations, fundraising activities and trading.

The Charity is extremely grateful to the local community for the continual dedication, commitment and generosity they show in supporting towards meeting this target.

Route highlights

Before you even step on to this year's route, here's a taster of some of the highlights that you can expect to see. We hope you'll be impressed by the stunning landmarks we have squeezed into this three and a half mile walk.

Downing College

Date founded: 1800

Downing College is an anomaly in terms of age compared to the other colleges. Referred to as "the oldest of the new and newest of the old", it was the first college to be added to Cambridge in over 200 years.

Hidden away in the heart of Cambridge, you will find Downing College's 20 acre site contains an impressive diversity of gardens, lawns, trees and flowers, from the expanse of the quadrangle lawns, to the unusual mixed borders of the sunken garden and the rich assortment of trees in the Fellows' Garden. Limes, maples and a dawn redwood in the Paddock offer further variety, whilst the wildflower habitat lures bees and butterflies and the hazel spinney attracts wildlife.



Famous alumni include:

Clive King – author (Stig of the Dump), Henry Naylor – script writer (Spitting Image), John Cleese – actor and comedian (of Monty Python fame), Quentin Blake – cartoonist, illustrator and children's writer, Amol Rajan – new question master for University Challenge

Darwin College

Date founded: 1964

Darwin was Cambridge University's first graduate-only college, and the first college to admit both men and women. Its main building, Newnham Grange, was previously owned by Sir George Darwin, son of the famous Charles Darwin, and later by George's son Sir Charles Darwin. After the death of Sir Charles in 1962, the Grange was donated by the family for the foundation of Darwin College, which was named after them.

Sir George Darwin's daughter Gwendolen, later known as Gwen Raverat, was a famous artist and wrote a fascinating book entitled "Period Piece", which described her childhood in Newnham Grange and the Cambridge of her youth.







Famous alumni include:

Paul Clement – former United States Solicitor-General, Gajan Pathmanathan – Sri Lankan first-class cricketer, Dian Fossey – American conservationist, Jane Goodall – British primatologist



Ridley Hall

Date founded: 1881

Named after the sixteenth-century Protestant martyr and Bishop of London Nicholas Ridley, Ridley Hall opened its doors in 1881 to train people for ordained ministry.

Under the leadership of the College's first Principal, Handley Moule, the student body grew from an initial eight students to forty by the early 1900s.

Many of the College's early alumni joined Anglican parishes throughout Britain but Ridley's alumni played a considerable role in helping to build the Anglican Communion and have significantly influenced the Church and its mission ever since.

Over the last century and a quarter Ridley has grown and changed, and now prepares a diverse group of women and men of all ages for both lay and ordained ministry. It also offers a space for private study, spiritual renewal and refreshment to those taking a break from their careers or established ministries.

In November 1931, Mahatma Gandhi visited Ridley Hall, as part of a short trip to Cambridge.



Famous alumni include: John Sentamu – previously Archbishop of York, Gavin Peacock – retired footballer and TV pundit, David Sheppard – former test cricketer and Bishop of Liverpool





Newnham College


Date Founded: 1871

Newnham was established in 1871 as a house in which young women could reside while attending lectures in Cambridge. It was the second pioneering college to be founded for women and moved to its current site in 1875.

There were two attempts to get degrees for women, in 1897 and in 1921. In both cases, the male MAs of the university voted substantially against granting degrees to women. After the 1921 vote, some male undergraduates smashed down the bronze gates at the entrance to Newnham College in jubilation at women's exclusion from degrees. Women were finally allowed to become full members of the university with the granting of degrees to women in 1948 and, starting in 1972, all the existing men's colleges began to admit women. Newnham and Murray Edwards colleges are the only colleges which remain single-sex, admitting only women.

You will be entering the college through the original entrance – the Pfeiffer Arch, with its (repaired) bronze gates.

Selwyn College

Date Founded: 1882

Selwyn College was founded in 1882 by the Selwyn Memorial Committee in memory of George Augustus Selwyn (1809–1878), the first Bishop of New Zealand (1841–1868), and subsequently Bishop of Lichfield (1868– 1878). Its main buildings consist of three courts built of stone and brick (Old Court, Ann's Court, and Cripps Court), and there are plans to expand with further phases of new buildings.

The gardens of Selwyn College, which are reputed to be some of the best in Cambridge, stretch down to the exit onto the Sidgwick Site.

Famous alumni include:

Clive Anderson – comedian and TV show host, Hugh Laurie – actor, comedian, writer, and musician, Simon Hughes – Lib Dem politician, Tom Hollander – actor



King's College

Date founded: 1441

Like many colleges, the 'real' name of King's College is different from that by which it is generally known. Its formal name is "The King's College of Our Lady and St Nicholas in Cambridge". It was founded by King Henry VI in 1441 to provide a college for the further education of students from his school for poor boys (Eton College) which he had founded in 1440. One college alumnus, John Harington (1560 – 1612) is credited with inventing the flush toilet, having devised and installed one in his manor house in Somerset. He called it The Ajax – a pun referencing the slang term 'jakes' (which occurs in Shakespeare's plays). Unfortunately, he failed to invent the S-bend in the waste pipe, so it was rather malodorous, but an improvement on other toilet arrangements of the time!

The chapel at King's is possibly the most instantly recognisable building in Cambridge. The televised service "Carols from King's" is recorded there every year in mid-December and shown on the BBC at Christmas. The radio version "Nine Lessons and Carols" is broadcast live on Christmas Eve.

Francis Walsingham – Principal Secretary and spymaster to Elizabeth I, Robert Walpole - Whig politician and de facto first Prime Minister of Great Britain, MR James - medievalist scholar, author of ghost stories, Provost of King's and Eton Colleges, EM Forster - author (Room with a View, Howards End, Passage to India, and others), Rupert Brooke - WW1 poet and soldier (also famous for poem about Grantchester), Xu Zhimo – Chinese romantic poet whose poem about Cambridge is studied by all Chinese school students, Alan Turing mathematician, cryptanalyst, computer scientist, leading participant in Bletchley Park success in breaking German Enigma Code in WW2, Mervyn King – professor of economics, previously Governor of the Bank of England, Salman Rushdie - novelist (Midnight's Children, Satanic Verses), David Baddiel - comedian, presenter, screenwriter, and author, Zadie Smith - professor of creative writing and novelist




Emmanuel College

Date Founded: 1584

Emmanuel College (often colloquially known as Emma) was founded in 1584 for 20 students as the first college intending to train Protestant (as opposed to Catholic) priests, on the site of a dissolved Dominican friary. The college was known for its relatively relaxed approach, raising eyebrows for introducing a sitting communion and for permitting fellows to play bowls in the gardens on Sundays.

The original chapel was built on the foundations of the monks' dining hall but was replaced in the late 17th century by one designed by Christopher Wren – the 3rd Wren building in Cambridge. The pond dates back to the time of the monks, when the fish were cultivated for eating. However, you will also walk through an interesting newly opened development housing accommodation and communal areas for students.

One of its most famous alumni was John Harvard who studied at Emma from 1627 – 31. He went to New England as a colonist in 1637 but died of TB in 1638; he left half his estate and his collection of classical and theological literature to the nascent college in Newtown, Massachusetts (now known as Cambridge, Mass.). His gift ensured the college's survival, and it was named after him in recognition. Emmanuel still has close links with Harvard University and every year students can apply for scholarships to study at Harvard.

William Sancroft – 79th Archbishop of Canterbury from 1677 – 90, Jeremiah Horrocks – founding father of British astronomy, Karel Reisz – film maker and film critic, Griff Rhys Jones – comedian, writer, actor, and TV presenter, Graham Chapman – actor, comedian, writer, and member of the Monty Python team, Thomas Young – polymath and physician, Sebastian Faulkes – novelist, journalist and broadcaster, Fred Hoyle – astronomer and science fiction author, FR Leavis – literary critic, Stephen Sackur – TV journalist (currently presents HARDtalk), Dan Stevens – actor (Matthew Crawley in Downton Abbey)





Useful information about Bridge the Gap walk

Here are a few helpful reminders for the day

Date: Sunday 10 September

Location: Parker's Piece, CB2 1AA

Start times: 9.30am, 10am or 10.30am

Closing times: The Colleges will begin to close from 11am, sequentially in the order that they appear on the route. Their closing times can be found on your map. The entertainment, Time for Cake tent and activities on Parker's Piece will draw to a close at 2pm. All cakes have been kindly baked and donated by volunteers, so please do give generously.

Toilets: There will be public toilets available at Parker's Piece, a small fee is applicable Toilets are also available at Lion Yard and on the route, as indicated on your map. **First Aid:** Provided by EMAT First Aid at Parker's Piece.

Wristbands: Please note that all walkers will be required to wear their Bridge the Gap wristband, whilst taking part in the event. Access into Colleges may not be permitted for those not displaying their wristband.

Safety: Please take care on Parker's Piece as there may also be a cricket match taking place at the Pavilion, please be respectful of this.

Photography: Please note that event and press photographers will be taking photos throughout the event. If you don't wish to be photographed please let them know.



The Route: The route is wheelchair and pushchair friendly. We respectfully ask that you refrain from smoking and consuming alcohol whilst in College grounds and ask that you do not walk on the grass. For minor first aid incidents during the walk please contact your nearest Marshal. If you have arrived at a College after the designated entry time (displayed on the route map), please note a fee may be required to enter the grounds. The Colleges permit access free of times during the allocated time period and therefore we ask all participants to be respectful of the generous agreement of the Colleges, from which we benefit.

Getting there...

By car: Parker's Piece is in the centre of Cambridge, and the nearest car park is the Queen Anne Terrace car park. Please bear in mind it may be busy during the weekend. For more information, visit the car parking map on the Cambridge City Council website www.cambridge.gov.uk/parking Alternatively, there are five Park & Ride sites around the city all of which drop off into the city centre. **By bus:** Parker's Piece is only a short walk away from the central bus station. Please visit the Cambridgeshire County Council website for more information on bus services.

By train: The City Centre is approximately a 20-minute walk from Cambridge railway station. Upon leaving the station proceed straight down Station Road and turn right onto Hills Road. Walk down Hills Road until you reach the Catholic Church. Turn right at this crossroads, on to Gonville Place and Parker's Piece is on the opposite side of the road.

Tell your friends: If you have friends or family not yet signed up, they can register online at **arhc.org.uk/btg** until 1pm on Wednesday 6 September. Alternatively, 'Pay on the Day' registration begins online from 00.01hrs on Sunday 10th September, and is also available at Parker's Piece on the day* from 9am – 10.30am, adults £22.50 and children free**

*Card payments are accepted. **Up to 3 children under 16 per paying adult.
